The Conference Team would like to say a huge thank you Cheviot Trees Ltd.



Prof June Andrews OBE FRCN FCGI MA LLB is qualified to advise on issues involving older people, their health care and carers, how to age well, the quality, finance and economics of care home and home care, dementia, staffing, and policy issues around frailty and the ageing population. experience in the NHS as a nurse and a manager, in care homes, as a trade union leader, in Scottish government and at a university, her views are independent and authoritative, based on evidence about what works and wide knowledge built over many years of advising families, professionals, organisations and governments nationally internationally on policy and practice in this area and how to deal with a personal crisis or more generally the economic and social issues arising from the aging population. June has recognised for her capacity to explain complex issues, whether finance, politics, neurology or human emotion, in plain language. Her talks are described as refreshing and often amusing, though deadly serious and based on evidence. Her book "Dementia - the One Stop Guide" has sold almost 50,000 and has a number of international editions. adviser the Dementia to Development Trust and has produced broadcast material for them and for the BBC. Currently her top queries are from families in turmoil caused by a parent with dementia and how to choose a care home.

David is founder and CEO of Street Soccer Scotland and Street Soccer London, non-profit social enterprises that use football to help create positive change in the lives of socially disadvantaged adults and young people.

Most recently, he has set up Change Centre Scotland, a sport and education centre with a vision to tackling isolation, homelessness, supporting mental health and well-being by creating on site personal development and self-management support.

Alongside his own social enterprises, David regularly sits on Government task forces and advisory groups, is an Advisory Board Member for UNICEF (Scotland) and also an advisor to AR26 Charity, founded by Scotland Captain and Liverpool FC star, Andy Robertson.

Angus Loudon was educated at The Edinburgh Academy. He graduated from The University of Edinburgh in 1981, and was commissioned from RMA Sandhurst into The King's Own Scottish Borderers in January 1982. His military career saw him serve across the world including in the UK, Germany, The Netherlands and Kenya, and with operational tours of duty in Northern Ireland, Kosovo, Bosnia, Iraq, Afghanistan and Cyprus. He was appointed MBE in 1994 for service in Northern Ireland.

On leaving the Army in 2015, he was appointed as the Chief Executive Officer of St John Scotland, where he has responsibility for the delivery of all the charity's operational output, including patient transport services, public access defibrillators, CPR training and support to community first responders, along with St John Scotland's international work in the Middle East and Africa. He was made a Commander of the Order of St John in 2021.

This experience highlighted the international nature of service and the striking similarities between the Rotary's and the Scout movement's commitment to serving others.
